

# FR. KLEINE'S KORNER

I've worked a total of ten years in the fast food industry.

I began at age fifteen and worked all through the end of college right up to the point where I entered seminary.

And I hated it.

Okay, that's not fair. I loved my time at Back Yard Burgers. Their burgers are freshly grilled to order and they're delicious! Go check them out now and tell them Fr. Andrew Kleine sent you (tip of the hat to you Mr. Scassellati)!

But I do not look back fondly on my seven years as a manager at Arby's. Demoralizing monetized work atmosphere. Void of human affirmation aside, the job was unfulfilling - debilitatingly so. I would pour myself into that job. Fifty hour work weeks became 60 to 80 hours. A plethora of times I would travel across Missouri to help out at other stores. I rarely if ever said 'no' to a request from upper management. I made this job the priority, and yet at the end of the day I would feel empty and depressed.

I sought to make this job a means to support myself, and instead was left questioning why I was working so hard and giving so much to a job that left me with no real affirmation and no sense of fulfillment.

What was the point of working all these hours and earning this pay if I had nothing worthwhile to work towards, if my only value to the company was as a cog in the machine?

It was coming at the expense of my own happiness, my faith, and my time and relationships with my family, my friends, and my God?

I had let my prayer be replaced by work, and my work to be done without prayer.

Thankfully, it was those same friends and family that helped me escape that downward spiral, to finally stop and listen to God, and to hear His call to the priesthood.

St. Benedict, founder of the Benedictine Order, based his life, his spirituality, and the rule of life of his monastic order around a single phrase.

Ora et labora.

Work and prayer.

It was his belief that the two were allies within the life and faith of a person. He held that the two needed to be balanced and in harmony with each other. Just as Pope St. John Paul II advocates that Faith and Reason are two avenues to lead us to contemplate, know, and love our Lord and His will, St. Benedict advocates that Prayer and Work are two means in which we come to not only contemplate our Lord, but live a life that emulates His own. Through a life of prayer lived in work and work offered in prayer, we draw closer in relation and love to Jesus Christ.

Moreover, we can cooperate with the works of salvation that He worked during His earthly ministry and had started since the beginning. We can be a cooperative instrument of His will that works to bring His love and salvation to all.


Our prayer without works flowing from it becomes stilted and lifeless.

Similarly, our work without prayer to support it becomes weary and unfulfilling.

The challenge is not to fall into the same pit that I had, where one consumes the other at terrible expense to oneself. Rather, through the grace of God and the prayerful intercession of His angels and saints, strive to find the balance between them that St. Benedict lived and professed. A balance where our faith and prayers can be lived out in every work we do, and our work will always be lovingly directed towards and in cooperation with our Lord and His will for us.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

You can feel so small standing by the seashore. The vastness of all that is before you expands much farther than your eye can see. What is happening on the other side? As tides continue to ebb and flow, what occurs as they come and go remains largely a mystery and the effects of their presence unknown in your sight. Yet, things are moving and changing as you gaze upon the water, as the thumbprint of their presence is left behind. The greater the wind and wave, the greater the effect. But even a gentle breeze leaves its humble mark upon the seashore on which you stand. The smallest pebble still makes a ripple in the great blue expanse of ocean waters. It doesn't need to be big.

You never know the full impact of your smallest gesture or simplest of words. A yes or no, agree or disagree, here or there, this or that can influence time and history in ways you may never know. The Holy Spirit is like that: fierce and torrential, and then almost still and silent, creating and recreating nonetheless. Coming as a gentle breeze or a gusty wind, God's Holy Spirit continues to move over, around, and into the waters of our lives. The Spirit brings fruit and unknown possibilities to what we humbly bring with us and that same Spirit eventually brings all to fulfillment in Christ.

The first disciples didn't have much. They possessed simple faith and a willingness to go into unchartered territory with a love of their friend-God, humble offerings, and a knowledge that they were not alone. This allowed them to do amazing things with very little. Do you believe that you are being led and that you have a purposeful life? We often do not realize our value because we do not think that the little we have is good enough. How wrong we are! A little flour mixed with water and embraced by a prayer of blessing transforms simple offerings into the magnificent Eucharistic presence of God. If the Holy Spirit can do such amazing things with these humble gifts of the earth, even more can happen with you. Don't underestimate the value of the smile you gave a stranger, the door held open for an elderly widow, the listening ear offered to one who was lonely, the tolerance given to the wounded soul who is angry, and the loving shoulder you offered as a cradle under the head of someone in pain. Modest gifts offered with love can be transformed by the Spirit into wondrous blessings you may never know. It's Pentecost. Trust. You are not alone.
