The Church and the Death Penalty

On July 25th the US Department of Justice announced that it will resume executions of death row inmates. Ending a 16 year moratorium, the DOJ has scheduled executions of five prisoners in December 2019 and January 2020. There have been only three executions since the federal death penalty was restored in 1988 and only 37 overall from 1927 to 2003.

Hopefully it will not surprise anyone to learn that the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has been opposing the death penalty for the past 40 years. Being consistently prolife, also calls us to oppose the death penalty.

In extreme circumstances, it is legitimate to sanction the use of lethal force in defense of our families and nation. The use of these lethal measures, however, require us to only use the amount of force necessary to achieve our security. State-sanctioned capital punishment, when these lethal measures are not strictly necessary to protect society, violates respect for human life and dignity.

While the Church recognizes that legal punishments can be a benefit to the common good, this punishment should not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption. Because the death penalty is an irreversible act, it also makes it possible for the state to accidentally kill a completely innocent person.

As the USCCB has argued, in a number of cases, trials leading to the death penalty have been shown to be "prone to errors in

evidence, biased by factors such as race, the quality of legal representation, and where the crime was committed" (CLDP, 2005).

It has become popular recently to ask if the Church has always been opposed to the death penalty. The answer is that the death penalty is not like direct involvement in procured abortion, which is always evil regardless of the circumstances (Gospel of Life 62).

The traditional understanding of the Church does not exclude the state having recourse to the death penalty, when after a fair trial, and when a person is found guilty of certain grave crimes, this extreme means is used to safeguarding the common good.

As St. John Paul II pointed out, however, in our modern world recourse to the death penalty is valid only "when it would not be possible otherwise to defend society" through some other non-lethal means. While the death penalty is not completely excluded in theory, "such cases are very rare, if not practically non-existent" in our modern world (Gospel of Life 56).

There is no doubt that Pope Benedict XVI agreed completely with this teaching. In 2008, he remarked, "I rejoice that on 18 December last, the General Assembly of the United Nations adopted a resolution calling upon States to institute a moratorium on the use of the death penalty, and I earnestly hope that this initiative will lead to public debate on the sacred character of human life." (Speech to the Vatican Diplomatic Corps, 2008).

In 2011, Pope Benedict XVI encouraged the participants at a conference in Rome op-

posing the death penalty. "I express my hope" said Pope Benedict XVI, "that your deliberations will encourage the political and legislative initiatives being promoted in a growing number of countries to eliminate the



death penalty and to continue the substantive progress made in conforming penal law both to the human dignity of prisoners and the effective maintenance of public order" (General Audience, 11.30.2011).

St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI and most recently, Pope Francis have consistently spoken out against the use of the death penalty in our modern world. Recently, Pope Francis revised the Catechism of the Catholic Church to even further strengthen the church's opposition to the death penalty.

Pope Francis observes that our increasing awareness of the dignity of the human person, our new understanding of the significance of penal sanctions, as well as the development of more effective systems of detention, have created new circumstances which must be considered in this mater (CCC 2267).

Recently Pope Francis revised the paragraph in Catechism on the death penalty to read, "Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that 'the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person' and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide" (CCC 2267).

FR. KLEINE'S KORNER

Time travel doesn't really work.

Don't get me wrong, it's a plot device that has led to some wonderfully entertaining stories: Back to the Future, Terminator 2, and *Doctor Who*, with David Tennant as the best doctor. Even Avengers Endgame utilizes time travel quite liberally. But it's a plot device that requires the audience to completely suspend their disbelief. Not only is it scientifically untenable, but it leads to all sorts of logical fallacies and paradoxes when employed. It's fun, but not supported very strongly, if at all, by reason or science. As a result, stories either have to just accept that there are large plotholes and logical inconsistencies in their narrative, or they have to take time to hand wave the problems away.

Doctor Who does this to hilarious effect when the 10th Doctor played by David Tennant explains that "people assume that time is a strict progression of cause to effect, but actually, from a non-linear non-subjective viewpoint it's more of a big ball of wibbly wobbly, timey wimey...stuff."

It's not just time travel that has this problem in stories. Magic, super powers, sci-fi technology, zombies; there's an abundance of plot-devices or story elements in fictional narratives that aren't exactly supported or defended with any strength by actual science or reason.

But it's a story, meant to entertain, and so we do as we should, we suspend our disbelief regarding these scientific or logical problems. We sit back and we enjoy the story for what it is, a story.

Unfortunately, this same view has been applied to the Catholic faith. Since the Renaissance, there has been a growing belief among the world's populace that the creed and doctrines and teachings of the Catholic Church are a lot like time travel, scientifically untenable and unreasonable. The notion is that if the facts and findings of science and reason were to be applied to the beliefs and faith of the Catholic Church, then like the plot devices in fiction, that faith would fall apart and dissolve under this scientific scrutiny.

This misconception has caused a great many people to dismiss the Catholic faith outright.

Or to leave it all together.

Because who wants to practice and live a faith that is unscientific?

That can't be supported by reason?

Yet this viewpoint is itself untenable! After all, all of creation, all of existence comes forth from God. That includes science! Our faith and our science and our reason all have the same source as their origin, our Lord in Heaven.

To say that science and faith contradict, or that reason opposes faith, is to say that our God purposely deceives us. It is to say that our God has intentionally gifted us two opposed means of knowing the world and Him.

And our all-loving Lord would not do something so cruel, especially when His entire goal is for us, all of us, to know and love Him as He knows and loves us.

In truth, science and faith are not enemies, they're allies that we in our erroneous thinking have pit against each other.

Pope Saint John Paul II states that "Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth; and God has placed in the human heart a desire to know the truth—in a word, to know himself."

And we see this evidenced in the works of past Catholics who've taken great strides through science in an effort to come to know God better. From Gregor Mendel, the father of Genetics to Fr. Georges Lemaitre, who discovered the Big Bang Theory, and who was colleagues with Dr. Albert Einstein. The Vatican itself has a Pontifical Academy of Science.

So it becomes our responsibility to not turn these two means of knowing against each other, but to see how they harmoniously work in unison to lead us to God.
