From The Pastor's Pen



FR. KLEINE'S KORNER

So Marvel Studios has just released their projected movie schedule for the next three years. "Phase Four" of the Marvel Cinematic Universe is going to start with a Black Widow solo movie, which presumably will follow the title character's adventures prior to the events of Infinity War and Endgame. Then we're getting movies like The Eternals, Shang-chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings, Doctor Strange 2, and Thor 4. This isn't even including the movies that will come out on Disney's new streaming service that also will connect to the larger Marvel Cinematic Universe, or their tie-in TV shows.

Compound upon this that Endgame was a wonderfully satisfying conclusion to Marvel's twenty-two movie story arc, and that Spider-Man Far From Home is such a solidly written Spider-Man movie and this is a pretty stellar time to be a Marvel Comics fan, or a superhero fan in general.

Yet as wonderful as all of this is, it can be a little overwhelming at times. Distracting even. This isn't necessarily a problem when one is prudently exercising leisure time to read or watch these stories.

But when I'm trying to pray a rosary or preparing to celebrate the Mass, and I find myself thinking about Spider-Man's final fight versus Mysterio and not about our Lord or the Sacred Mysteries in which I am about to participate in, then we have a problem.

I'm sure that all of us at one time or another have found ourselves distracted during prayer, be it while at Mass or while saying the rosary. Despite our best intentions, we find our minds wander and lose focus on our Lord and our praise and worship to Him. Instead, we find ourselves dwelling on other flights of fancy.

Sometimes all this requires is a more disciplined approach on our part. A greater zeal of focus and participation in prayer and the Mass and a casting of these thoughts and these distractions aside. As much as I'm looking forward the Chiefs prospective playoff and Superbowl hopes this season, they don't play for another month and a half. I can put those thoughts aside to focus on the greater holier task at hand while praying the rosary or participating in the Sacred Liturgy.

But sometimes, greater discipline or zealous focus of thought is not enough. Sometimes our mind is occupied not about leisurely or frivolous things, (please forgive me God for saying that about Spider-Man and the Chiefs), but about things of greater import:

our family, our job, our health, greater and weightier struggles and anxieties and worries hold our attention, no matter our efforts and intentions. We know that in this moment we should be praying to God, or asking for the Blessed Mother's intercession, but we can't stop dwelling on the recent loss of a family member, or a negative medical diagnosis, or troubles with work or at home, or tensions in a friendship. And the more we try not to think about these things, the more we inevitably think about not thinking about them.

And these are good things to focus on, to give our attention and concentration to. It would be wrong to ignore them or treat them as trivial. Yet we also know that it is our Lord and our participation in the celebration of the Mass that should rightly have our undivided attention in those moments.

When such situations happen, and we find that despite our best efforts, our mind is being pulled taut in multiple directions by multiple worries, try this. Rather than spending your efforts exorcising these worries and anxieties from your mind, instead make them part of your prayer. Take a moment in prayer, during the Mass, during the Rosary, and address what it is you are struggling with and bring it to the foot of our Lord's cross.

Be it a loss in the family, struggles with work, or problems with friends or family members, don't ignore the problems. Address and recognize what has our attention in a vice grip. Make it part of our prayer, part of our offering. Invite the Lord in that moment of prayer to help you with everything you're worrying about. With every distraction, no matter how great or seemingly insignificant, bring it to God. Ask Him to help us with it. Ask Him to help us with these worries, to help us trust Him to aid us with these struggles, and to help us give the fullness of our attention to Him during prayer.


And then we'll be doing what we set out to do in the first place, giving everything we are and everything we have as a prayer offering to our Lord, to be united to the offering on the altar of the Most Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist.

LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW



Here and Now: Living in the Spirit

By HENRI J. M. NOUWEN

Henri Jozef Machiel Nouwen, a Dutch Catholic priest and educator, was born January 24, 1932. His belief was

that if we live in the present, we will notice the small miracles that reflect God's love for us. The spiritual life is not a life then and there, but a life here and now. It is a life in which the spirit of God is revealed in the ordinary encounters of everyday.

In *Here and Now*, Henri Nouwen shows, in a personal and insightful way, that God is much closer to us than we usually realize. He explains how prayer, forgiveness, gratitude, and compassion are the essential elements of an ongoing process of conversion through loving encounters with family and friends.

Henri Nouwen writes about the job in the midst of our sorrows, about the gains and losses of friendship and family, about the hardships and rewards of prayer, about forgiveness and compassion, discipleship and discipline, and the lifelong process of conversion.

He looks with a smile and a tear at the day-to-day events of our lives and discovers there places where God chooses to dwell and call us.

Henri Nouwen was one of the most prolific and popular spiritual writers of our time. He wrote more than 40 books and taught at the University of Notre Dame, as well as Yale and Harvard. He died September 21, 1996.

The greatest trap in our life is not success, popularity or power, but self-rejection. --Henri Nouwen.


