## DYNAMIC PARISH - WE JOURNEY TOGETHER

Our Dynamic Parish focus for 2020 is a **Year of Prayer**. Once again our current situation of uncertain times and isolation brings prayer to the center of our days. But always, time, and what is happening, and what will happen, and what will pass, is uncertain but this has always been with us. One of the most hopeful and thoughtful reflections on time is: *Ecclesiastes 3:1-18*

*For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:  
a time to be born, and a time to die;  
a time to plant,*

*and a time to pluck up what is planted;  
a time to kill,  
and a time to heal;  
a time to break down,  
and a time to build up;  
a time to weep,  
and a time to laugh;  
a time to mourn,  
and a time to dance;  
a time to throw away stones,  
and a time to gather stones together;  
a time to embrace,  
and a time to refrain from embracing;  
a time to seek,  
and a time to lose;*

*a time to keep,  
and a time to throw away;  
a time to tear,  
and a time to sew;  
a time to keep silence,  
and a time to speak;  
a time to love,  
and a time to hate;  
a time for war,  
and a time for peace.*

This year, 2020, has been a time of challenge but in our Year of Prayer, we find hope for a wonderful future.

We may be getting a little... let's say, weary.

Our current situation is not going to be resolved any time soon. Even with the lifting of the quarantine's restrictions in our various counties, our entire world is moving forward not in an "all clear" mentality, but in an "ease back in" mentality. Recovery and return to 'normalcy' will be slow, deliberately so, all in the effort to be prudent and charitable with others' wellbeing, health, and safety. Not to mention that our 'normal' will be forever changed to some degree or another.

It's that slow trek to return to 'normal' and the slow enduring of these hardships that we may find is causing us to feel fatigued. Motivation and enthusiasm may be taking quite the hit in all stages of our life, and that can include our relationship with God. The enforced restrictions or the repetitious limitations and seeming monotony of the day, coupled with all the prolonged disruptions to our normal routines and the hardships we continue to endure can eat away not only our patience or our perseverance, but that fire of love within us, be it that fire of love for our family, our hobbies, or our Lord.

We may even find ourselves becoming weary of playing the video games we love to play and watching the movies we love to watch (I promise you Star Wars Knights of the Old Republic II and Lord of the Rings Trilogy that won't happen; you guys are my family, and I would never tire of you).

The weariness can even wear down our love, especially during a time when things are slow to change or improve.

To prevent the vice of acedia from seeping into and infecting our lives, our Lord and His Church offers us three suggestions (well, they offer us a multitude of suggestions, but here's three):

### 1) Invite God In

- our Lord desires to be a part of every aspect of our lives, including the lowest points; He wants to accompany us on our journey to Him in Heaven, and wants to help us along the way; if we're finding our-

selves worn down and spiritually exhausted, turning to the source of all grace and love to help us carry that cross is as fundamental as it is essential; bring that exhaustion, that fatigue, that anxiety, frustration, and despondency into relational prayer with God, and thereby making it a means to deepen that relationship, and inviting the Lord to help us through it: He wants to accompany us in every aspect of our journey

### 2) Grace in Community

- we are deliberately made by our Lord to be in community with each other and to help each other; let's not try to give into the prideful lie of strength coming from accomplishing things alone; any football team worth their salt knows that a solo mentality leads to disaster; if we're in a low point or undergoing hardships, availing ourselves to conversation with and help from our friends, family, and community can literally be a Godsend, be this through the phone, email, video chat, or even snail mail (the Lord has gifted us the myriad of angels and saints to call upon for intercessory aid as well)

- furthermore, moving to helping others with their difficulties or low points, and being a source of charity and kindness for them can simultaneously help us to bring out of our low points.

### 3) Counting our Blessings and Remembering the Why

- resting in a mindset of gratitude can help us to persevere in difficult times; recounting and praying on our blessings each day, and giving ourselves time to reflect on them and give thanks for them can help to move us out of a prolonged stay in our "stuckin' thinkin'"; writing these blessings down, trying to expand upon them, or trying to add one more each day can help us to realize how loved we are by our Lord and help us to rest in that love.

- keeping a prayerful focus on the "why" we are enduring and striving through these hardships can be quite a boon for us too; surviving just to survive can lead to fatigue;

surviving as a testament of our love for our Lord, our family, and even ourselves makes all we do an act of love, not endurance, and maybe even acts of love we joyfully carry out.

Lastly, for our further prayerful reflection and aid, these Catholic speakers and their suggestions can be of great help for us as well. The Lord is so great that He can bring His grace and love out of any situation, any hardship, and any trial. He's doing that for us now, and is asking us to be open to discerning how He's trying to meet us and be with us during this pandemic.

Let's strive to be open to His guidance and His love.
